9. The word "Anishinabeg" means "the people."
10. The Three Fires consisted of three Michigan Native American tribes. They were known as the Ottawa, the Ojibway and the Potawatomi. (on the test students do NOT need to spell the name of the tribes—they are written for them)
11. People trade for items because they need it or don't have it. It is scarce.
12. The Native Americans have left us many gifts that we still use today. One is foods such as corn, pumpkins, beans, and tobacco. Another gift is names, such as Kalamazoo, Mackinaw, Pontiac, and Saginaw. They also gave us inventions like the toboggan, the birch bark canoe, and showshoes.
13. Legends are stories the Native Americans told around the fire to explain facts and share stories about the past. Native American legends explained how maple sugar was discovered, told guidelines to live by, told about Hiawatha, and explained how Sleeping Bear dunes came to be.
